Corruption. Corruption is one of John Webster's most pervasive themes in The Duchess of Malfi, operating on at least three levels: political, moral, and physical (bodily). Antonio Bologna introduces the theme in the opening lines of Act 1, Scene 1. In commenting to Delio about the French court, he remarks that politics function like a fountain that can be easily poisoned at the source.
